WEATHER TODAY (TUESDAY):

WEATHER: Hot and dry with weak upper level disturbance increasing winds and destabilizing the airmass, but any thunderstorm will remain north over Mendocino NF. Light NE morning winds becoming stronger WSW in afternoon...then northerly again overnight.

TEMPERATURES: 96-100 *Trend: Little Change*
RELATIVE HUMIDITY: 8-13% *Trend: Little Change*

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP – NE 2-5 mph...gusts to 8-10 mph, shifting ESE after 1000.
Around 1400, shifting WSW 8-12 mph gusting to 20 mph...then becoming N-NE 3-6 mph toward 2200.
SLOPE/VALLEY – Upslope/S-SE 3-6 mph and eddying with gusts to 10 mph in aligned canyons, then shifting downslope after 2100.

LAL: 1 **STABILITY/INVERSION:** Inversion lifting around 1200.
SMOKE TRANSPORT WIND: E 3-6 mph becoming SW 10 mph in the afternoon.

WEATHER FOR TONIGHT AFTER 2200: Light northerly winds to keep limited RH recovery values.

Low temperatures: 65-72 Max RH: 30-50%. Lowest in thermal belts.

20 Ft Winds: Ridgetop: N-NE 2-4 mph...gusts to 9 mph toward sunrise.
Slope/Valley: Downcanyon 2-5 mph gusting to 8 mph in aligned canyons.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: Weak upper level disturbance will make airmass slightly more unstable and increase ridge winds Tuesday. Ridging builds Wednesday with slightly warmer temps and similar humidity from Tuesday. Upper low stalls to south and brings easterly winds Wed into Fri with more unstable conditions. Any thunderstorm activity should still remain north over Mendocino NF. RH will have limited increase.

OUTLOOK FOR WEDNESDAY/THURSDAY:

Wednesday: Hot with NE winds shifting SE-SW in afternoon with low pressure to south. T-storms remain north.
High temps: 97-101. Max/ Min RH: 30-45% / 10-15%. Winds: NE ridge winds 2-5 mph gusting to 9 mph shifting SE-SW in the afternoon with gusts to 15 mph. Then winds shift NW-NE 2-6 mph toward midnight.

Thursday: Upper low to south and not as hot with SE-S winds with low pressure to south. T-storms remain north.
High temps: 94-98. Max/ Min RH: 45-65% / 13-18%. Winds: NE ridge winds 2-5 mph gusting to 9 mph shifting SE, then S late in the afternoon with gusts to 15 mph. Then winds shift NW-NE 3-6 mph toward midnight.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL:

The fire during the 1st burn period went from a moderate rate of spread of 7 – 10 acres to a dangerous rate of spread to an estimated 900 acres by 0200 hrs. Intensity dropped considerably in the early am hours to approximately 1200 hrs of the second burn period. Numerous spot fires were established with wind driven influences pushing fire downhill at critical rates of spread. Fuels include annual grass, shrub and brush with mixed patches of pines. Areas of drought stressed and swaths of dead trees were at 100% P(I)G. Structures added to the intensity of extreme fire behavior.

All fuels are having an adverse drought response with higher levels of torching and ignition receptivity, with many areas having complete consumption. ERC Values at proximal weather stations are showing near or at max levels (97%).

Suppression resources should expect extreme fire behavior during firing operations or fire involving structures or other debris like items.

SPECIFIC:

Fuels are extremely receptive to new fire starts and large growth should be expected with any established free burning.

Branch I With minimal amounts of control line, the terrain and receptive fuels will create opportunities for aggressive fire extension.

Branch II Based on the expected winds and terrain this will be a significant area of concern. Slop overs and spot fires were only contained on Monday with significant and aggressive suppression actions. Any established fire should be expected to challenge direct attack capabilities.


1. the state of having been made ready or prepared for use or action.

- ALL PPE must be worn when working on the fireline.
- Avoid complacency by focusing on the task at hand.
- WATCH OUT for aggressive driving. Drive Defensively and ensure headlights are on.
- Identify fire hydrants and water source locations in your assigned work area. Check functionality before having a need to utilize.
- Beware of environmental hazards such as bee hives, poison oak, trip hazards, steep slopes and stump holes.
- Ensure radios are properly programmed for today's IAP and all crewmembers are familiar with incident communication plan.
- Ensure that all personal items, work related equipment, and apparatus are secured at all times.
- Maintain situational awareness when working around burned or damaged structures. Unmarked hazards still exist.

Ash Pit Awareness

- Observe the remnants of the vegetation model.
- Look for depressions in the ground.
- Use your hand tool to sound your way into the burn.
- White ash may be an indicator of an ash pit.
- Ensure that PPE is worn and properly fitted.

ALL	FATIGUE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Be alert for signs of fatigue and take breaks as necessary. Adhere to the 2 to 1 work rest cycle. Monitor incoming resources for level of fatigue.
ALL	PERSONNAL SAFETY	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All personnel are responsible for their personal safety. Ensure that personal items and work related equipment are secure at all times. Immediately report any suspicious activity to your supervisor.



**Archaeological and Historic Properties:
General Fire-line Guidance for the BLM Ukiah Field Office.**

**Do not compromise safety for the protection and preservation of archaeological and historic properties.
When possible and prudent:**

1. Be on the lookout for prehistoric and historic archaeological sites. These sites typically occur adjacent to streams and springs, confluences are often especially sensitive. However, sites can occur in other areas too. The most common indicators of prehistoric sites in this area (North Coast Ranges) are scatters of shiny black obsidian flakes from tool making activities and dark midden soils. Historic-era sites include homesteads that contain foundations, rock chimneys, and stone / brick-lined wells. Historic-era mining sites are possible as well.
2. Note, that much of the area has never been surveyed for archaeological resources and many sites out there have yet to be discovered.
3. If you observe archaeological resources, flagged or unflagged, attempt to avoid with ground disturbing activities altogether.
4. If avoidance is not possible, minimize ground disturbance. Use a hand crew rather than a dozer to remove fuels from control lines that must cross site areas if possible.
5. Leave all artifacts in place as some may have been intentionally placed for religious or ceremonial reasons.
6. Note locations of discovered resources on a map, better yet, take site coordinates with a GPS. Leave information for the archaeologist so that the sites can be relocated and protected during Fire Suppression Repair. Flag the site in red if possible.
7. If you encounter a burial or other human remains, cease work in that area and contact the archaeologist immediately.

Your help preserving California's non-renewable cultural resources is appreciated.
