GENERAL:

- Very heavy fuel loading of oak litter and brush.
- Fuels within the entire burn area are drought stressed.
- Ladder fuels are in contact with ground fuels creating easy transitions from ground fires to torching oak trees = Potential Spot Fires
- Heavy Fuel Loading!!! Last major fire in the area was 1960.
- Fire activity will be minimal with inversion in place; however a significant increase will occur when the inversion lifts. Estimated around 1300

Flame Lengths- Head fire: 4-10 ft. in Grass, 11-17 ft. in Brush, Flanking fire: 2-6 ft. in Grass, 3-8 ft. in Brush

Spotting Distances- Up to 0.3 miles in Grass, Brush and Leaf Litter

Major Hazards and Risks: Limited Resources, Extremely Dry, Cured, Drought Stricken Fuels, and Fatigue.					
Fire Behavior: Fuels are drought stricken and are receptive to fire spread. A small amount of wind on this dry fuel changes the game dramatically!! Be alert to changes in wind direction and expect changes in fire behavior. Flare-ups generally occur in deceptively light fuels, such as grass and light brush or islands within fire perimeters of unburned or partially burned fuels.					
Personnel: Manage yourself and those around you for fatigue; many have driven long distances or been deployed for extended periods. As fatigue increases, injuries tend to increase also. Keep an eye on your crew and partner.					
Limited Resources: With resource needs at a premium, tactics may be adjusted, however, SAFETY must never be compromised.					
Hydration: By the time your body tells you it's time to drink – you are already DEHYDRATED!!! On a regular basis drink fluids to maintain an appropriate energy level for any expected work assignment. Remember, you are the only one that knows your limitations.					
Hazard trees: Survey your work areas for hazard trees, flag and restrict access, use only qualified personnel for tree felling. Review and follow Hazard Tree Safety , pg. 22-23 in your IRPG.

CHIMNEY INCIDENT RISK ANALYSIS (ICS 215a)

DIV	HAZARDOUS ACTIONS/CONDITIONS	MITIGATIONS / WARNINGS / REMEDIES
ALL	EXTREME FIRE BEHAVIOR	Know your LCES and maintain Situational Awareness. Use experienced Look Outs. Adhere to the downhill line construction guidelines. Monitor weather for changes in the wind, temp, and RH when the inversion lifts. Expect rapid rates of spread with long range spotting, have a contingency plan with established decision points and safety zones.
ALL	FATIGUE/HEAT/DEHYDRATION	Be alert for signs of fatigue and take breaks as necessary. Monitor incoming resources for level of fatigue. Drink water before, during and after shifts, up to 1.5 gal. per shift. Be alert for signs of heat stress in yourself and others; use the buddy system. Eat small meals often and when possible Drink electrolyte drinks at a 3 water to 1 sport drink ratio.
ALL	STEEP TERRAIN / ROLLING DEBRIS	Watch your footing while hiking in steep terrain. Be careful of loose rolling debris Maintain Situational Awareness.
ALL	HAZARD TREES	Identify and isolate the area to provide for the safety of others. Flag and make proper notifications. Do Not Fall trees out of your certification level.
ALL	LINE CONSTRUCTION	Conduct thorough briefing for all personnel (inside rear cover IRPG). Ensure LCES in place prior to engagement (IRPG p. 6). Establish adequate safety zones (IRPG p.7). Use Downhill Line Checklist (IRPG p. 8). Follow "Look Up, Look Down, Look Around" procedures (IRPG p. 2-3). Utilize Risk Management Process (IRPG p.1).
ALL	DRIVING HAZARDS	Slow Down! Drive defensively! Expect the unexpected around every curve. Drive with headlights and seatbelts on. Narrow roads with limited passing room. Coordinate your movements on one-lane roads. Use warning devices when operating near traffic.
ALL	AIRCRAFT OPERATIONS	Monitor air-to-ground frequency, they are your eyes in the sky. Use air-to-ground frequency to communicate with aircraft. Use clear, concise statements when directing aircraft. Only utilize aircraft to insert personnel on the line when necessary.
ALL	DOZER SAFETY	Watch for rolling material. Monitor safe working distances. Avoid working below Dozer. Utilize communication with the operator (radio or hand signals)
ALL	POWER LINES	Follow <i>Power Line Safety</i> guidelines (IRPG pg.24.) Extinguish all power poles that are on fire before the fall. Communicate power line hazards to supervisor and hazard flag accordingly. Flag area around downed power lines and deny access. Treat all downed power lines as energized.
ALL	STRUCTURE DEFENSE & HAZARDS	Conduct thorough briefing for all personnel (inside rear cover IRPG). Follow <i>Wildland Urban Interface Guidelines</i> (IRPG p. 12-16).
ALL	PERFORM TAIL GATE SAFETY MEETINGS	Everyone should be briefed on the conditions and circumstances regarding the fire and their assignments per the IRPG. Ensure all personnel have PPE, food, and water.



CAL FIRE INCIDENT MANAGEMENT TEAM WATER USAGE PLAN

California Drought Emergency

The following shall be considered and implemented by all fire resources as a means to provide maximum efficiencies when utilizing water resources, while minimizing the impacts to private and public water supplies. Accountability shall be maintained for all water supplies that are utilized and care should be applied to ensure proper replacement and/or reimbursement to the supplier/ owner.

Fireline personnel- (During mop up operations)

- Use of Pencil Hose and Garden Nozzles with Shut-Offs.
- Use of Back pumps.
- Dry Mop-up and consolidation of heavy fuels to areas where they can burn out safely
- Locate/ Relocate Firelines to lighter fuels or natural barriers when safe.
- Set up and use portable tanks in anticipation of longer transport times for Water Tenders.
- Use of foams, gels and other water enhancers.
- Evaluate need to mop up in excess of 200 feet from fireline

Road Maintenance and Repair-

- Monitor and water roads only when and where needed.
- Water when most effective (evening and nights).
- Use chemical treatments when available (Magchloride, Omni bind ect).
- Consider use of tertiary or treated water (sp)

Aviation Operations-

- Use of Gels, Foams and Retardants. Set up portable plants.
- Consider Blivits and Pencil hose for interior mop up operations as opposed to numerous bucket drops.
- Establish and use pre-use agreements for existing and known water sources.
- Use large watershed dip sites when able. Minimize use of small, static ponds and lakes.
- Maintain accountability of water used and locations of dip sites.
- Evaluate need for interior bucket drops

Private Water Supplies-

- Notify property owner as early as possible.
- Minimize usage and develop alternative water supplies when and where appropriate.
- Track usage (meter, 214 form) and develop a plan to replace water.
- Make arrangements for reimbursement and damage claims if needed.

Public/ Municipal Water Supplies-

- Notify Agency as soon as possible and request a representative to the incident.
- Identify fill areas and request metering devices. Place on incident map.
- Use alternative or reclaimed water sources when available. Place on incident map.
- Make arrangements for reimbursement and damage claims if needed.

Management and Supervision-

- Use leaders intent and establish Water Conservation as an Management Objective.
- Consider complexity of water use on incidents. Establish a Water Supply Group Supervisor to coordinate additional resources to support the incident needs.
- Complete the Water Usage Report daily and turn in to Finance
- Review this check list and brief daily.

Bring your video and pictures to the Public Information trailer; they will be reviewed and possibly uploaded to our many CAL FIRE social media sites. Remember, we don't want photographs or videos that depict unsafe, unprofessional or embarrassing circumstances, which are a serious breach of ethics. You can also send your photographs and videos to the following email "*team email*".

LOST AND FOUND – The Information Section will manage lost and found items for the incident. If you have lost an item please leave your contact information and what you have lost at the Information Section. If you have found an item on the incident, bring the item to the Information Section with your contact information as well.
