WEATHER DISCUSSION: The western portion of the Chimney fire moved into an area influenced by the cooler and more humid marine air. Temperatures in this area will only top out in the low 70s, along with afternoon humidity around 50% and onshore winds.

The remainder of the fire will remain in the warmer and drier air mass. Temperatures for this area will warm into the 90s, along with minimum relative humidity values in the low teens. Winds will increase out of the south-southwest around 10 mph with higher gusts during the afternoon and into the early evening.

Temperatures will fall into the middle 50s overnight with humidity recovery of 60 percent or higher. The gusty southwest winds will persist through sunset, diminishing to less than 5 mph overnight in locations below 2000 ft. Areas of the fire in elevations above 2000ft can expect winds to turn out of the east at 5 to 10 mph after midnight.

GENERAL: The fire is burning in a mix of grass and brush with stands of Oak trees and litter that are extremely dry, very drought stressed, and have a heavy fuel loading. Even with the higher humidity on the west side of Rocky Butte Trail, the fire will continue to be active and produce high rates of spread. Rates of spread will change when fire transitions between changing fuel models. Fire activity will continue to increase in the late morning to early afternoon and burn active into the late night hours.

Major Hazards and Risks: Fatigue, Extremely Dry, Cured, and Drought Stricken Fuels.

Hydration/Nutrition/Fatigue: Drink plenty of fluids throughout the day and eat accordingly. Address dehydration and fatigue concerns immediately upon symptom onset.

Hazard trees: Survey your work areas for hazard trees, flag and restrict access, use only qualified personnel for tree felling. Review and follow Hazard Tree Safety, pg. 22-23 in your IRPG.

Fire Behavior: Fuels are drought stricken and are receptive to fire spread. A small amount of wind on this dry fuel changes the game dramatically!! Flare-ups generally occur in deceptively light fuels, such as grass and light brush or islands within fire perimeters of unburned or partially burned fuels.

Powerline Safety: Use caution when working around powerlines, watch for possible downed lines and treat all lines found as energized until it is confirmed they have been de-energized.

Driving: Steep, narrow, dusty roads throughout fire area. Maintain safe following distances and appropriate speed when traversing roads. Flag unstable roads and other hazards that may be encountered while driving. Repopulation in place, careful of public on roadway.

Communication: Confirm all personnel have latest clone, test prior to going to line. Utilize human repeaters as necessary. CMD channels are linked, try alternative channels if unsuccessful with primary.

Resource Accountability: Maintain prompt communications with your forces, your supervisor and adjoining forces. Give clear instructions and ensure they are understood.

Lookouts, **C**ommunication, **E**scape routes, **S**afety zones

FIREFIGHTING ORDERS

1. Keep informed on fire weather conditions and forecasts.
2. Know what your fire is doing at all times.
3. Base all actions on current and expected behavior of the fire.
4. Identify escape routes and safety zones and make them known.
5. Post lookouts when there is possible danger.
6. Be alert. Keep calm. Think clearly. Act decisively.
7. Maintain prompt communications with your forces, your supervisor, and adjoining forces.
8. Give clear instructions and insure they are understood.
9. Maintain control of your forces at all times.
- 10. Fight fire aggressively, having provided for safety first.**

- *RH*
- *Winds*
- *Fire Behavior*
- *Topographical boundaries*
- *Time constraints/Time of day*
- *Time /distance to safety zones*
- *Loss of suppression resources*
- *Fatigue, loss of Lookouts, or Communications.*



CAL FIRE WUI Guidelines

STRUCTURE DEFENSE TACTICAL ACTIONS

CHECK AND GO

"Check and Go" is a rapid evaluation to check for occupants requiring removal or rescue.
Structure Triage Category – Threatened Non-Defensible

PREP AND GO

"Prep and Go" implies that some preparation of the structure may be safely completed prior to resources leaving the area. Structure Triage Category – Threatened Non-Defensible

PREP AND DEFEND

"Prep and Defend" is a tactic used when a Safety Zone and TRA are present and adequate time exists to safely prepare a structure for defense prior to the arrival of the fire front.
Structure Triage Category – Threatened Defensible

FIRE FRONT FOLLOWING

"Fire Front Following" is a follow up tactic employed when Check and Go, Prep and Go, or Bump and Run tactics are initially used. A tactic used to come in behind the fire front.

BUMP AND RUN

"Bump and Run" is a tactic where resources typically move ahead of the fire front in the spotting zone to extinguish spot fires and hot spots, and to defend as many structures as possible.

ANCHOR AND HOLD

"Anchor and Hold" is a tactic utilizing control lines and large water streams from fixed water supplies in an attempt to stop fire spread. The goal is to extinguish structure fires, protect exposures, and reduce ember production.

TACTICAL PATROL

"Tactical Patrol" is a tactic where the key element is mobility and continuous monitoring of an assigned area.

LEVELS OF ENGAGEMENT

PACE

Implement PACE. prior to engaging in any structure protection action.

P - Primary Plan [Offense]

Is focused on fire fighter safety and mission objectives

A - Alternate Plan [Offense]

A fall back plan that closely supports the Primary Plan

C - Contingency Plan [Defense]

Focused on the firefighter's safety, move to a safety zone or temporary refuge area

E - Emergency Plan [Defense]

Firefighter survival, deployment zones, fire shelters

ALWAYS HAVE A DEPLOYMENT SITE IDENTIFIED!

DRAW-D

D - Defend – Holding actions, protecting priority areas, protect the structures, hold and improve the line

R - Reinforce – Bring more resources to bear, add resources necessary to *advance* or *defend*

A - Advance – Anchor and Flank, Direct or Indirect Attack, Active burnout operations

W - Withdraw – Cease current activities until conditions modify, Abandon an established position or constructed line in response to an increase in fire intensity, Not a stigma, but a decision to move away from a threat

D - Delay – Wait until the situation has modified sufficiently to allow a different level of engagement, Waiting for conditions to meet pre-identified triggers necessary to *advance* or *defend*, not a lack of effort, but a conscious decision to maximize long term effectiveness

WATER USAGE PLAN

California Drought Emergency

The following shall be considered and implemented by all fire resources as a means to provide maximum efficiencies when utilizing water resources, while minimizing the impacts to private and public water supplies. Accountability shall be maintained for all water supplies that are utilized and care should be applied to ensure proper replacement and/or reimbursement to the supplier/ owner.

Fireline personnel- (During mop up operations)

- Use of Pencil Hose and Garden Nozzles with Shut-Offs.
- Use of Back pumps.
- Dry Mop-up and consolidation of heavy fuels to areas where they can burn out safely
- Locate/ Relocate Firelines to lighter fuels or natural barriers when safe.
- Set up and use portable tanks in anticipation of longer transport times for Water Tenders.
- Use of foams, gels and other water enhancers.
- Evaluate need to mop up in excess of 200 feet from fireline

Road Maintenance and Repair-

- Monitor and water roads only when and where needed.
- Water when most effective (evening and nights).
- Use chemical treatments when available (Magchloride, Omni bind ect).
- Consider use of tertiary or treated water (sp)

Aviation Operations-

- Use of Gels, Foams and Retardants. Set up portable plants.
- Consider Blivits and Pencil hose for interior mop up operations as opposed to numerous bucket drops.
- Establish and use pre-use agreements for existing and known water sources.
- Use large watershed dip sites when able. Minimize use of small, static ponds and lakes.
- Maintain accountability of water used and locations of dip sites.
- Evaluate need for interior bucket drops

Private Water Supplies-


- Notify property owner as early as possible.
- Minimize usage and develop alternative water supplies when and where appropriate.
- Track usage (meter, 214 form) and develop a plan to replace water.
- Make arrangements for reimbursement and damage claims if needed.

Public/ Municipal Water Supplies-

- Notify Agency as soon as possible and request a representative to the incident.
- Identify fill areas and request metering devices. Place on incident map.
- Use alternative or reclaimed water sources when available. Place on incident map.
- Make arrangements for reimbursement and damage claims if needed.

Management and Supervision-

- Use leaders intent and establish Water Conservation as an Management Objective.
- Consider complexity of water use on incidents. Establish a Water Supply Group Supervisor to coordinate additional resources to support the incident needs.
- Complete the Water Usage Report daily and turn in to Finance
- Review this check list and brief daily.





LOST AND FOUND – The Information Section will manage lost and found items for the incident. If you have lost an item please leave your contact information and what you have lost at the Information Section. If you have found an item on the incident, bring the item to the Information Section with your contact information as well.
