WEATHER DISCUSSION:

**...Flash Flood Watch from 2 PM Friday through Noon Saturday...
...Wind Advisory until 11 AM today...**

An unseasonably strong low pressure system will be located off the southern California coast will begin to shift inland today. This system will bring periods of showers with isolated thunderstorms with the best chance being from mid afternoon and through early Saturday. Snow levels near 7000 feet in the morning will lower to 6000 feet tonight. Depending on where the heaviest showers develop, precipitation amounts could range from a quarter of an inch to over 1 inch. Snowfall amounts will range from 1-3 inches at 6000 feet to 3-6 inches at above 7500 feet. Gusty south winds will continue today...with gusts to 30 mph. This system will exit the region Saturday night with a slight chance of showers continuing into Saturday evening. Skies will clear with warmer and drier conditions expected Sunday through Tuesday.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Fog and drizzle in the morning...mainly along Div A and Z. Otherwise mostly cloudy with a 20 percent chance of showers in the morning...increasing to a 50 percent chance of showers with a slight chance of thunderstorms in the afternoon.

TEMPERATURES: Highs 43-55.

HUMIDITY: Minimum 40-50 percent...except 70-80 percent where low clouds and fog persist.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - South 10-20 mph with gusts to 40 mph in the morning...southeast to south 6-15 mph with gusts to 30 mph in the afternoon.

SLOPE/VALLEY - Southeast to Southwest 10-15 mph with gusts to 30 mph in the morning... decreasing to 5-10 mph with gusts to 20 mph in the afternoon.

FORECAST FOR TONIGHT: Showers likely with isolated thunderstorms. Snow level lowering to 6000 feet. Low 26-36. Max Humidity 80-100 percent. Ridgetop winds: South 10-20 mph with gusts to 30 mph. Slope winds: Southeast to Southwest 7-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR SATURDAY: Mostly cloudy. A chance of showers with a slight chance of thunderstorms in the morning...decreasing to a slight chance of showers in the afternoon. Snow level near 6000 feet in the morning...rising to 7500 feet in the afternoon. Highs 50-60. Minimum RH 35-50 percent. Lows 28-38. Max RH 70-80 percent. Ridgetop winds: South 10-20 mph with gusts to 35 mph in the morning...becoming west 10-15 mph in the afternoon. Slope winds: South to Southwest 7-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph in the morning...becoming southwest to west 5-10 mph in the afternoon.

EXTENDED FORECAST:

Sunday...Partly cloudy. Highs 60-70. Lows 30-40. Minimum RH 20-30 percent. Max RH 50-60 percent. Ridgetop winds West to Northwest 5-10 mph.

Monday...Mostly clear. Highs 62-72. Lows 33-43. Ridgetop winds variable 5-10 mph.

Tuesday...Mostly clear. Highs 65-75. Lows 36-46. Ridgetop winds variable 3-8 mph.

FIRE BEHAVIOR ANALYST

WEATHER FORECAST: Cold, windy and damp weather continues....SEE THE ATTACHED FIRE WEATHER FORECAST FOR THE LATEST and be sure to monitor your local conditions.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL DAY SHIFT: There was little fire activity yesterday and with an increasing chance of showers very little fire activity is expected today. How little fire activity will depend on the fine fuel moisture. Rain, drizzle or fog will raise fine fuel moistures to the point fire activity will be confined to smoldering 100 and 1000 hour fuels (large fuels). Without rain under mostly cloudy skies it is possible, although unlikely, the fire could spread within containment lines in unburned fuels. In the absence of rain, fine fuel moistures will be 10-14 percent, rates of spread are 3-15 chains/hr and flame lengths are 2-4 feet. Spotting is unlikely but possible up to 0.4 miles from a torching tree and the actual ignition probability of a thrown ember igniting is less than 25%. The adjective rating for Fawnskin and Big Pine Flats, 2 RAWs stations in the area is Low to Moderate depending on the fuel model.

SPECIFIC DAY SHIFT:

Branch I: Little fire activity is expected today. Holdover fire is still possible in the heavier fuels.

Branch II: Suppression has greatly reduced the chances of having a containment issue on this branch. Heavier fuels will continue to smolder and if next to unburned fuels could lead to some minimal fire spread in the absence of rain.

OUTLOOK FOR SATURDAY: With precipitation coming to an end later in the afternoon fuels will start drying out. Conditions will not improve fast enough for fire activity on Saturday and any burning will continue to be limited to heavy fuels that were not suppressed and have not been fully consumed.

AIR OPERATIONS: Sunrise is at 0635 and sunset is at 1846.

SAFETY: Slippery fuels, rocks and dirt will be a big hazard if rain starts during the shift. Be sure to stay focused on your task and environment so any hazards are mitigated.


