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**WEATHER DISCUSSION:**

**...Flash Flood Watch in effect until Noon...**

The low pressure system that has been off the coast the past 2 days will lift northeast today. The chance of showers and thunderstorms will decrease through the afternoon. A few clouds will remain Sunday as the system continues to move away from the area. A ridge of high pressure building off the coast will bring warmer temperatures for Monday and Tuesday.

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**WEATHER FORECAST:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly cloudy with a chance of showers and a slight chance of thunderstorms in the morning. Snow level near 7000 feet. Becoming partly cloudy with a slight chance of showers in the afternoon. Snow level rising above 7500 feet.

**TEMPERATURES:** Highs 48-58.

**HUMIDITY:** Minimum 35-45 percent.

**20 FT WINDS:**

**RIDGETOP -** Southwest 10-20 mph with gusts to 35 mph.

**SLOPE/VALLEY -** Southwest 10-20 mph with gusts to 35 mph in the morning...decreasing to 5-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph in the afternoon.

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**FORECAST FOR TONIGHT:** Partly cloudy. Lows 30-40. Max Humidity 60-70 percent. Ridgetop winds: West 5-15 mph. Slope winds: West to northwest 5-12 mph.

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**OUTLOOK FOR SUNDAY:** Partly cloudy. Highs 60-70. Minimum RH 25-35 percent. Lows 34-44. Max RH 50-60 percent. Ridgetop winds: West to northwest 5-12 mph. Slope winds: Upslope/upcanyon 5-10 mph...becoming variable 3-6 mph Sunday night.

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**EXTENDED FORECAST:**

Monday...Mostly clear. Highs 62-72. Lows 33-43. Min RH 20-30 percent. Max RH 50-60 percent. Ridgetop winds: Northeast 5-10 mph. Slope winds: upslope/upcanyon 3-8 mph.

Tuesday...Mostly clear. Highs 65-75. Lows 36-46. Min RH 15-25 percent. Max RH 40-50 percent. Ridgetop winds: variable 3-8 mph. Slope winds: upslope/upcanyon 3-8 mph.

Wednesday...Mostly clear. Highs 68-78. Lows 36-46. Min RH 15-20 percent. Max RH 40-50 percent. Ridgetop winds: Southwest 5-12 mph. Slope winds: upslope/upcanyon 5-10 mph.

FIRE BEHAVIOR ANALYST

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**WEATHER FORECAST:** Cold, windy and damp weather continues for at least 1 more day....SEE THE ATTACHED FIRE WEATHER FORECAST FOR THE LATEST and be sure to monitor your local conditions.

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### FIRE BEHAVIOR

**GENERAL DAY SHIFT:** Yesterday ended up being a better fire day than expected. Temperatures got into the low 60s and relative got as low as 27 percent. Despite this there was only one area of heat found and it was well inside the perimeter in the afternoon. The adjective rating at Big Pine Flat and Fawnskin was Moderate.

Rain was expected overnight last night and into the morning hours today. This will raise fine fuel moistures so that no fire spread will occur. Heavy fuels may continue to support combustion unless a large amount of precipitation is received. Even this activity will be confined to smoldering. Even if conditions become partly cloudy the fine fuels are not expected to dry out enough to support spread. The adjective rating for today is Low. The Energy Release Component is expected to be 54.

If there isn't any rain overnight, fine fuel will be dry enough to support fire spread. While there is a very low chance of spread occurring on this fire, similar conditions on an unsuppressed fire in similar fuels could produce spread rates at 3-15 chains/hr. Under this scenario the flame lengths are 2-5 feet and spotting distances are up to 0.4 miles. The probability of ignition on this rain-free, unsuppressed fire would be less than 50%.

### **SPECIFIC DAY SHIFT:**

**Branch I:** This division will not be staffed today and will be monitored by air if weather conditions permit.

**Branch II:** Division Z showed the one lone hotspot yesterday. Without rain it's possible a few more smokes could show up tomorrow. No challenges to containment are expected.

**OUTLOOK FOR SUNDAY:** Fuels will continue to dry out and fine fuels will be approaching their pre-rain moisture. Larger fuels will need continued drying to recover. Spread in unburned fuels will be possible again today however larger fuels will still be losing moisture from the rain and will help curtail fire activity.

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**AIR OPERATIONS:** Sky conditions should be improving during the day. Sunrise is at 0636 and sunset is at 1845.

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**SAFETY:** Be sure to maintain your situational awareness today. Fire line conditions have likely changed with the rainfall. Be sure to scout existing and new hazards.

# Thunderstorm Safety

Approaching thunderstorms maybe noted by a sudden reverse in wind direction, a noticeable rise in wind speed, and a sharp drop in temperature. Rain, hail, and lightning occur on in the mature stage of a thunderstorm.

Hypothermia is a sudden and profound cooling of the temperature in the core of your body to below 96 degrees F. The core for this point of discussion is your torso and your head where your vital organs are located.

Although this 2-1/2 degree F. drop from a healthy normal 98.6 degrees F. seems slight, it can have a crippling effect to the body. Continued cooling can result in an irregular heartbeat that can lead to death.
