WEATHER DISCUSSION:

The low pressure system that brought rain to the area yesterday will continue to move away from the area today. Skies will begin to clear today with warmer temperatures and drier conditions for Monday through Thursday.

Today is the first day of autumn. The Autumnal Equinox was at 251 AM this morning.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Partly cloudy in the morning...becoming mostly sunny in the afternoon.

TEMPERATURES: Highs 57-67.

HUMIDITY: Minimum 30-40 percent.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - West to northwest 5-12 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY - West 5-12 mph.

FORECAST FOR TONIGHT: Mostly clear. Lows 34-44. Max Humidity 60-70 percent. Ridgetop winds: Variable 3-8 mph becoming northeast 5-10 mph after midnight. Slope winds: Variable 3-8 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR MONDAY: Mostly sunny. Highs 65-75. Minimum RH 18-28 percent. Ridgetop winds: Northeast to east 5-12 mph. Slope winds: East 5-10 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR MONDAY NIGHT: Mostly clear. Lows 34-44. Max RH 50-60 percent. Ridgetop winds: Northeast to east 5-10 mph. Slope winds: Variable 3-6 mph Monday night.

FIRE BEHAVIOR ANALYST

WEATHER FORECAST: Everything begins to dry out today from the higher humidity and showers of the last couple of days...SEE THE ATTACHED FIRE WEATHER FORECAST FOR DETAILS.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL DAY SHIFT: Yesterday's rain showers have come to an end and fuels will begin drying out today. Yesterday one of the RAWs stations, Rock Camp, recorded over 0.92" of rain and it was only 10 miles west of the fire! Another RAWs, Big Pine Flats, is 12 miles northeast of Rock Camp and is very near the fire. It received 0.02 inches of rain. The Fawnskin RAWs, which sets on the southeast side of Big Bear Lake, received only 0.01 inches. The bottom line is rainfall amounts varied widely, but it appears the fire itself received very little rain. For Fawnskin, the adjective rating today is Low and the ERC value is forecasted to be 45.

Fine fuels should be dry enough to support fire spread by afternoon. They are expected to be around 6-7 percent, which will yield a rate of spread of 3-9 chains/hour and flame lengths of 2-3 feet in timber/shrub fuels. Maximum spotting distances are just of 1,000 feet and the probability of ignition is 40-60 percent. Mop up distances inside the perimeter should be large enough to prevent any threats to containment today. Overall it should be a good day to continue mop up and rehab work.

SPECIFIC DAY SHIFT:

Branch I: This division will not be staffed today and will be monitored by air if weather conditions permit.

Branch II: There continues to be heavy fuels smoking in Divisions X, Y and Z. As fuels dry out it's possible some new areas of heat could show up but they are not expected to challenge containment lines.

OUTLOOK FOR MONDAY: Warmer temperatures and lower humidity will continue to dry fuels. Those areas that received little rain will be back to pre-storm moisture levels. Light winds will keep any fire activity manageable.

AIR OPERATIONS: Sky conditions should be improving during the day. Sunrise is at 0636 and sunset is at 1843.

SAFETY: While the fire may pose few safety concerns, activities surround suppression and rehab can. Damp fuels and rocks will be slippery. Some stump holes are a couple of feet deep and can be blend in with the black. Dozer lines may contain trees or shrubs that are under tension. Maybe on a break today you could review the "Watchout Situations" and see how many apply to Santa Ana conditions. The season for them is just around the corner.


