WEATHER DISCUSSION:

High pressure building over the region will bring clear skies...warmer temperatures and lower humidity the next few days. There will be a weak offshore flow which will bring some northeast to east winds at times Monday and Tuesday.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Sunny.

TEMPERATURES: Highs 63-73.

HUMIDITY: Minimum 15-25 percent.

20 FT WINDS:

RIDGETOP - Northeast to east 5-12 mph.

SLOPE/VALLEY - Northeast to east 5-15 mph.

FORECAST FOR TONIGHT: Clear. Lows 34-44. Max Humidity 50-60 percent. Ridgetop winds: Variable 4-8 mph. Slope/Valley winds: North to Northeast 5-15 mph. Gusts to 20 mph possible.

OUTLOOK FOR TUESDAY: Sunny. Highs 68-78. Minimum RH 15-20 percent. Ridgetop winds: Northeast to east 4-8 mph. Slope/Valley winds: East 5-15 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR TUESDAY NIGHT: Clear. Lows 38-48. Max RH 35-45 percent. Ridgetop winds: Northeast to East 5-10 mph. Slope/Valley winds: North to East 5-15 mph with gusts to 25 mph.

FIRE BEHAVIOR ANALYST

WEATHER FORECAST: A nice autumn day is on tap for today.... SEE THE ATTACHED FIRE WEATHER FORECAST FOR DETAILS.

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL DAY SHIFT:

Another day of drying is on tap for today. Some areas of the fire remained damp yesterday from the previous day's rain. While holding up fine fuel moistures yesterday, these damp areas should be pretty well dried out today. With relative humidity dropping into the upper teens under sunny skies, fine fuel moistures are expected to drop into the 3-6 percent range. In a timber/shrub understory (fuel model Tu2) spread rates of 3-10 chains per hour and 2-4 foot flame lengths are possible. Maximum spotting distances are less than 0.2 miles and probability of ignition is 50-80 percent. The forecasted ERC value for Big Pine Flats today is 44.

Fire activity on this fire will be confined to holdover smokes in the larger, heavier fuels. After several days of mop up and some light rain on at least part of the fire, these types of smokes should be well interior of the fire's perimeter. As fuels continue to dry more of these types of smokes are expected to show up. None are expected to pose a threat to containment lines.

SPECIFIC DAY SHIFT:

Branch I: This division will not be staffed today and will be monitored by air.

Branch II: There continues to be heavy fuels smoking in Divisions X, Y and Z. As fuels dry out it's possible some new areas of heat could show up but they are not expected to challenge containment lines.

OUTLOOK FOR TUESDAY: Today's conditions will be very similar to Monday's. Warmer temperatures and lower humidity will continue to dry fuels. Most areas of the fire will be to pre-storm moisture levels. Light winds will keep any fire activity manageable.

AIR OPERATIONS: It should be nice flying conditions today. Sunrise is at 0637 and sunset is at 1842.

SAFETY: While there has been little fire activity, it's not time to be complacent. Pay attention to fire conditions and watch for those burning stump holes. When these holes are next to unburned fuels, spreading is possible.

Do you have an escape route?

Are there rules being broken?

Is this work different from what you understood at the briefing?

There is still a good (or bad) chance of experiencing gravity hazards. The trees have had a chance of burning through, the roots are weakening, with or without wind, they will come down (gravity driven). Rollout materials are waiting for a chance to get up and run. Stay out of their way.

Dozer Use Handsignals.

Break out your IRPG to page 91.
This is a good briefing reminder for using hand signals when working around heavy equipment.

GOOD HYDRATION IS IMPORTANT DURING THE COLD AS WELL.
Measure the quality of your hydration by the hourly output, not necessarily by how much you drink.
