SAFETY IS PRIORITY	
STAY HYDRATED!!!!	
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Lookouts• Communications• Escape Routes• Safety Zones• Be alert. Keep Calm. Act decisively• Post lookouts when and where possible• Maintain communications with supervisor, your forces and adjoining forces• Give clear instructions and ensure they are understood	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Keep informed on fire weather conditions and forecasts• Know what the fire is doing at all times• Base actions on current and expected fire behavior of the fire• Identify escape routes and safety zones and make them known.• Maintain control of your forces at all times• Fight fire aggressively, having provided for safety first.

Hydration/Nutrition: Drink water all day long even if you do not feel thirsty. Eat plenty of healthy snacks to keep your energy up during the day. Watch others for dehydration and suggest drinking water if they are not.

Complacency: Keep your heads in the game. It's not over until you are home with your families! Please maintain LCES and ensure everyone on the crew is communicating possible hazards. Think about what you would do if your plan does not work. Always have a backup plan if something could go wrong. Do not horseplay.

Driving: Make sure drivers are rested. Swap out drivers if necessary. Use lights, seatbelts, chock blocks, and drive defensively. Scout rough roads before committing. Do not drive if you feel uncomfortable.

Steep Slopes: Watch footing. Take your time. Maintain awareness of other crew members in your vicinity. Watch for rolling debris and snags.

<p>In the event of a medical emergency the nearest fireline supervisor will coordinate emergency response by relaying the following information to the Safety Officer or Incident Commander:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Declare the nature of the emergency. <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Medical injury/illness? If injury/illness is it Life Threatening? 2. If Life Threatening, then request that the designated frequency be cleared for emergency traffic. 3. Identify the on-scene Point of Contact (POC) by Resource and Last name (i.e. POC is TFLD Smith), 4. Identify nature of incident, number injured, patient assessment(s) and location (geographic and GPS coordinates), 5. Identify on-scene medical personnel by position and name(i.e. EMT Jones), 6. Identify preferred method of patient transport, 7. Request any additional resources and/or equipment needed, 8. Document all information received and transmitted on the radio or phone, 9. Identify any changes in the on-scene Point of Contact or medical personnel as they occur
