

# PNW National Prevention Team-1 August 2016





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## Executive Summary

In an effort to reduce the potential impact of wildfires across eastern Washington, the Bureau of Land Management, Spokane District Office requested the assistance of a national fire prevention team. The team will focus our prevention efforts in the following priority counties: Lincoln, Douglas, Okanogan and Yakima. The main priorities of the District are reducing fires caused by target shooting and equipment use/agriculture burning. The Team will develop outreach materials and messages to address issues. The Team will also assist the District in developing a procedure to use in developing a framework for the District Wildfire Prevention Plan.

## Team Members:

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## **Objectives and Accomplishments**

The following objectives were included in the Delegation of Authority.

1. **In the Border Field Office, priority areas to focus on include: Lincoln County, shooting-related fires (including use of illegal exploding targets), outreach to local outdoorsman/hunting/ammo-selling retailers, Fairchild Airforce Base Recreation Department and the WA Department of Fish and Wildlife.**



**In the Wenatchee Field Office priority areas to focus on include, Douglas, Okanogan, and Yakima Counties.**

### **Accomplishments:**

- Held media site visit at Fishtrap Recreation Area. Reporters from the following TV stations were present: KXLY 4 (ABC), KHQ 6 (NBC) and KREM 2 (CBS). A reporter from KXLY 4 also interviewed Tammy Miller, property owner in Fishtrap area—that reporter’s coverage was excellent. The Spokesman Review ran an article using the media release and an interview with Jeff Clark, District PAO.
- At the media event, District fire personnel installed a large cooperative ‘Fire Danger’ sign at the entrance of Fishtrap Recreation Area. This project was in collaboration with Lincoln County Fire District #1, Chief Mitch Lowry, who also was present and provided interviews to the TV stations. Team installed our newly created ‘Shooting Safety’ flyers on bulletin boards at Folsom Farm, Miller Ranch, Farmers Landing trailhead and local businesses.
- A Labor Day news release was sent to the media giving prevention tips to follow during the holiday because of high fire risks; target shooting, campfires, and driving/parking on dry grass.



- Contacted Corrine Brown, Fairchild Airforce Base (AFB), regarding posting fire prevention material at the base. The AFB Marketing Director gave permission to display fire prevention posters on their base FSS facilities. However, someone with base access must do the posting. SPD PIO Jeff Clark agreed to follow up. A List of possible postings is shown in Appendix D.
- Met with cooperators to discuss the prevention products that were produced by the Team. Discussed issues and how we plan to cooperate in getting the products and messages distributed.

- Visited Jameson Lake Recreation area in the Wenatchee Field Office to review fire and recreation challenges. A list of recommendations for improving the prevention signage for this area is included in the Recommendation section of this final plan.
- 2. Obtain intelligence on current fire prevention efforts (including Northern Idaho), and determine whether they address the type of human-caused fires across Eastern Washington (BLM fires only).**

**Accomplishments:**

- Held meetings with Guy Gifford, Nick Jefferies, John McDonald, Washington DNR, Garth Davis, Eric Choker, Spokane Conservation District, Terry Lawhead, Washington Department of Commerce, Ryan Anderson, WAFAC, Jay Carmony, Washington Office of Ecology to discuss their current efforts in fire prevention and how we can coordinate more effectively. They will distribute prevention materials through their dissemination channels, using social media, mailings and one-on-one contact.
- 3. Develop outreach materials (consider English is Second Language materials) such as billboards and signs for BLM to post, as well as items that can be posted/handed out to local retailers as well as both TV and radio.**



## **Accomplishments:**

The visual products were created to encourage the public's compliance with fire restrictions by providing information in a clear, easy-to-read format.

Product headlines and permitted/prohibited graphics are in bold colors and are meant to pop out from a distance, encouraging readers to take a closer look at the content. This is especially important on bulletin boards and signs, where there are other messages competing for attention.

The graphics help illustrate what is permitted/prohibited. The human brain interprets the meaning of graphics quicker than words (A picture is worth a thousand words). Accompanying the graphics is an explanation in words, for those people who need a closed look at the details.



Many people experience reading difficulties in either vision or comprehension. Older audiences, people with vision difficulties, and those for whom English is a second language find that graphics help in understanding the message.

We are bombarded with so many messages, and it is critical that our fire prevention messages stand out when fire danger exceeds normal conditions. After a while, we screen out messages that we see often, like Unicorn signs at recreation areas and news releases and orders with only text posted on bulletin boards. These are a very effective means of communication during ordinary conditions; these products are not meant to replace them. That's why we create new versions, to attract attention to the message.

Some of the products feature a warmer, rustic look. These work well as handouts and in office situations. Other messages are bolder, with a white background. These will stand out better when seen from a distance or in darker conditions, like in a bulletin board under a kiosk.

Although the "Do Not's" are emphatic, the messages are meant to encourage compliance instead of threatening closure.

The files were created using Adobe Illustrator and exported to pdfs, for easier printing via the Government Printing Office. They are available in PowerPoint, for local editing and printing. They are also available in Spanish.

All products developed have been translated to Spanish by the team and reviewed by ¡Team Naturaleza! for accuracy of translation. See Products Library in Appendix F.

All final products will be posted on SORO ftp site for future use.

- Developed an Outreach Plan including a products library that can be used when messaging for fire restrictions, news releases, PSAs and possible future social media. See Appendix D.

**4. Develop a plan to disseminate (in priority areas) current fire restrictions information to the public.**

**Accomplishments:**

- Created a distribution plan for fire restrictions for the counties of Lincoln, Douglas, Okanogan, and Yakima. The plan includes a list of Fire Protection Districts, Fairchild AFB facilities, hunting clubs and a list of grazing allotments for the Spokane District. See Appendix E.

**5. Create a list of high profile events in priority counties to include both the cities of Spokane and Wenatchee. Develop a plan to target those events with both fire prevention messaging and fire restrictions messaging.**

**Accomplishments:**

- Created an ‘Outreach Plan’ that includes a matrix for fire prevention products/signs. Also includes messaging for issues that could be used for news releases, PSAs and possible future social media. The Outreach Plan includes lists of events, outdoor venues, Fairchild AFB, hunting groups and traplines for the Spokane and Wenatchee and Yakima Areas. See Appendix D.

**6. Help the District create components of a long-term plan to better outreach with its various partners, recreational users, school districts and county commissioners.**

**Accomplishments:**

**Fire Management Plans and Spatial Fire Planning Background:**

The BLM and Forest Service are transitioning to Spatial Fire Planning (SFP) and the Fire Management Reference System (FMRS; aka “fire encyclopedia”) and discontinuing the use of narrative Fire Management Plans. SFP and the FMRS will meet the intent of the Federal Wildland Fire Policy requiring a Fire

Management Plan for each acre of burnable vegetation (Forest Service only). The SFP process is nested within the WFDSS platform.

The BLM and Forest Service transitioned to SFP prior to fire season in 2016. However, the BLM is required to maintain a narrative Fire Management Plan. In 2012, IM #FA IM-2012-014 was issued, including guidance and a draft template for completing these plans. Lauren Maloney, SORO Fire Mitigation and Education Specialist can be contacted for further assistance.

**WA Spokane District situation:**

Historic Fire Management Plan: Fire Management Activity Planning (FMAP) was initially used to identify the organization and appropriate staffing based on fire activity, occurrence, and resource loss. Spokane BLM formerly contracted with the USFS for portions of the Spokane District. In the mid-1990's, that agreement was terminated. Since that time, the program has continued to grow in complexity and fire workload. The staff of one BLM Fire person was expanded and has grown to 12 FTE's now.

Numerous District staff have expressed commitment to drafting a Prevention Plan, including critical elements of complexity, interdisciplinary sign plan including input and review from cooperators and partners.

Fuels Specialist, Mike Solheim is representing the District in a new national effort to test new fire prevention planning software being developed by BIA. It is being modeled after the former Risk Assessment and Mitigation Strategies (RAMS) process which involves the well-established approach of mapping and evaluating the Risks, Hazards and Values of a defined sub-geographic area. Historic fire occurrence is then overlaid to consider and validate the human ignition patterns, expected future use patterns and activities and to formulate mitigation strategies and plans. This software testing is being conducted across Agency boundaries to include Service First units.

Spokane District's involvement in this process will provide the necessary groundwork for completion of a viable prevention plan that meets the intent of current fire management policy. *See Interagency Standards for Fire and Fire Aviation Operations, 2016, aka Redbook, Chapter 9 Fire Management Planning, pages 185-188 and Chapter 10, Preparedness: Fire Prevention/Mitigation Plans, page 195.*

- 7. Inform and engage the Washington Fire Adapted Community Learning Network during your team's assignment, advising them of key team strategies and work products.**

**Accomplishments:**

- Spoke by phone with Ryan Anderson, Dir. WA RC&D. The product library was emailed and also mailed hard copies for review and feedback. Also sent the 'Orchard Debris Burning' brochure for review and comment.
- Annie Schmidt, Director of the Chumstick Coalition and a WAFAC partner, has also been receiving Daily Reports and has communicated her support and interest in the graphics products.

- 8. Integrate Fire Adapted Communities messaging where practical into fire prevention messages and outreach material.**

**Accomplishments:**

Fire Adapted Communities messaging:

The WA-FAC Learning Network is a well-established, nationally-recognized collaboration of local partners and communities. This is the ideal venue for connecting the needs and responses to local fire prevention problems.

Fire Adapted Community principles include many programs and initiatives, including Firewise, Prevention Education and CWPP's.

WA-FAC participated in partner interviews while the NFPET team was in place. In addition, they have received the draft prevention products for review and comment. Additional partners were included in team daily report mailings, and will be included in the 'shared product' site upon final approval. Many of these same folks were contacted and/or participated in the 2014 (Leavenworth) and 2015 NFPET that was based in Wenatchee, and are familiar with NFPET's and their capabilities. These partners have been invaluable to the teams and their effectiveness on these mobilizations.

A CWPP meeting is scheduled for October, 2016. This will be a great opportunity to share the results of this NFPET's assignment. In addition, with the upcoming local Fire Prevention Plan endeavor, partners can be enlisted to participate, provide input and a review process. It's clear that all the cooperators, residents and employees we interviewed are interested and committed to investing in this process and its success.

9. **Establish a record keeping process to ensure adequate information and records are available once the team assignment is completed.**

**Accomplishments:**

- Produced Product Tracking Guide to show what materials have been ordered; with quantity, cost, date ordered, and expected delivery date.
- Team's financial report/spreadsheet will be provided to the host unit only.
- A Products Library of all products produced, with distribution for each, was created and included as Appendix F.

10. **A daily progress report on team activities and any needs will be sent to the District.**

**Accomplishments:**

Daily Reports were sent to the following:

- All OR/WA/AK FS and BLM Fire/Fuels/Aviation leadership (82 addresses)
- CPI; PNWCG's (Pacific Northwest Wildfire Coordinating Group) Communications, Prevention, and Investigations Committee: Includes reps from the OR/WA federal and state wildland agencies, State Fire Marshall's Office, Keep Oregon Green, etc.
- All Things Prevention: OR/WA/AK fire prevention personnel, NFPET team leaders and members, cooperators, WA-FAC representatives, PNW-FAC network, other fire prevention/mitigation education personnel across the nation.

## **Recommendations/Commendations/Training**

### **Recommendations:**

- Add a prevention tech during severity (seasonal staffing); Tech needs to have a 'plan of work' in place before reporting. Collaboration with Recreation could aid in funding and reduce travel, costs, etc.
- Need an interdisciplinary sign plan; survey sites for sign placement during periods of fire restrictions. Plan should include evaluation of appropriate locations, materials, graphic signing, seasonal messaging, etc.
- Coordinate with Washington State Fish and Wildlife to share fire prevention messages for target shooting, camping and dragging chains by boaters. They were not available during our assignment.
- Coordinate with National Park Service at boat ramps to post dragging chain and other fire prevention information.
- Consider ordering law enforcement personnel with prevention to patrol areas of high potential fire starts because of historical fire starts from shooting.
- Site assessment was made at the Jameson Lake Recreation area in the Wenatchee Field Office to review fire and recreation challenges and how fire prevention messages could be improved. We were unable to make contact with Jack's Resort owner because it is only open during fishing season, April through July 4th, and the season starting in October.

We found one bulletin board with a WA Fish and Wildlife "No Fire or Fireworks" sign. We posted both the "Fire Danger" and "Avoiding Fires" posters on the bulletin board. There was an old paper sign duct taped to the bulletin board that said "Welcome to Jameson Lake." To the right of the sign on a gravel road we saw the dispersed camping and shooting impacts; such as, shot-up materials, trash, and garbage in campfire rings. Sites are located approximately 100 feet apart, with various forms of targets including metal objects. The potential for fire is high in this area. The habitat is sage brush and greater sage-grouse. (See Randall's input for Risk, Hazards and Potential for Wenatchee)

The team makes the following recommendations:

1. Talk with the owner of Jack's Resort about entering into an agreement to place a sign at the entrance to BLM/DNRFW property. Resort owner would

- be responsible for changing the fire danger rating. The close proximity to the resort might provide better protection from vandals.
2. The existing information board could be expanded to encourage users year-round to use caution while camping or shooting; and pack out all debris and garbage. Consider using the new Tread Lightly's Respected Access campaign and materials <https://www.treadlightly.org/programs/respected-access-campaign/about-the-respect-access-campaign/> , as well as Leave No Trace, [www.LNT.org](http://www.LNT.org).
  3. Consider working with recreation to install a map on the bulletin board. A map could encourage users to spend time at the board. Place shooting and safety tips during the times of no fire restrictions. Only place restriction info when restrictions are in place.
  4. Remove restriction information when restrictions are lifted.

### **Commendations:**

Our agency host Richard Parrish, BLM, was very responsive in providing direction and filling the team's needs. We also appreciate the helpfulness of Jeff Clark, Spokane District PAO. He was able to get our media releases approved and out in a very timely manner; his follow up with the media was important to the success of our media site visit. Sandra Gourdin, Records Manager, was always helpful whenever we had questions about security procedures, etc. The Team also appreciates Samatha Fuchs for her timely assistance with our finance and printing needs.

The Team is very grateful for the host agency allowing Anthony Matthews to be a member of our prevention team. His assistance was invaluable in accomplishing our tasks in the short two-week period of our assignment. He served as a subject-matter expert on ammunition, shooting targets, developing local trapline as well as all printing logistics, including working with help desk to resolve printer issues.

### **Training:**



Fire Prevention and Education Team Leader and Member Training:

In 2014, the PNW began an effort to increase capacity of Fire Prevention Team Leader (PETL), Fire Prevention Team Member (PETM) and Public Information Officer (PIO2) participants for Fire Prevention Education Teams.

The August 23-Sept 6 NFPET on Spokane BLM attempted to bring additional trainees to the team. Due to fire activity at the beginning of the assignment, many trainees were unavailable. We were able to enlist a new PIOF(t) from Oregon with Spanish translation

skills. After completing most of the translation tasks for the team, we requested a Prevention Education Team Member (PETM) taskbook be issued by her home unit. They agreed, and we were able to transfer her to PETM(T) duties for the remainder of the assignment. This allowed her to complete tasks in both of these specialties and gain valuable skills for future deployments.

A local Pathways student was assigned to the team. This valuable resource provided daily on-site logistical support and continual orientation to the sub-geographic area and its challenges. He also provided continual team support in completing a wide variety of tasks including assisting as a Subject Matter Expert in the areas of target shooting, ammunition and appropriate messaging to user groups.



## COMMUNICATION PLAN / PLAN OF WORK

*(The 2016 PNW National Prevention Team will use the Final Plan of the 2015 Prevention Team to the extent that it applies to our Delegation of Authority.)*

### **Goals**

Stress the importance of preventing human-caused fires especially as it relates to target shooting and agriculture equipment/burning. The team will be working across eastern Washington with the Spokane District Office which includes the Border and Wenatchee Field Offices.

### **Target Audience**

- Recreationists (target shooters, campers, general visitors)
- Agriculture Community (equipment & orchard burning)

The target audience will be reached through prevention actions and products addressing the following objectives.

### **Objectives**

The following objectives were included in the Delegation of Authority.

1. In the Border Field Office, priority areas to focus on include: Lincoln County, shooting-related fires (including use of illegal exploding targets), outreach to local outdoorsman/hunting/ammo-selling retailers, Fairchild Airforce Base Recreation Department and the WA Department of fish and Wildlife.

In the Wenatchee Field Office priority areas to focus on include, Douglas, Okanogan, and Yakima Counties.

2. Obtain Intelligence on current fire prevention efforts (including Northern Idaho), and determine whether they address the type of human-caused fires across Eastern Washington (BLM fires only).

8. Integrate Fire Adapted Communities messaging where practical into fire prevention messages and outreach material.
9. Establish a record keeping process to ensure adequate information and records are available once the team assignment is completed.
10. A daily progress report on team activities and any needs will be sent to the District.

### **Key Points/ overall messages**

- Fire seasons are becoming longer and generally more challenging.
- It is time to change public expectations and increase public education regarding what the wildland fire community can and cannot do; and, what they can do to take responsibility.
- Approximately 75% of all wildfires are human caused. These accidental fires endanger communities, cost taxpayers millions of dollars every year to suppress, and can cause long-term damage to the environment.

## **Talking Points:**

- Wildfires caused by recreational target shooting in dry grasses have steadily increased on the Spokane District over the last few years. The easiest ways to prevent these fires from starting is to ensure your target area (at least 20 feet around the target) is free of dry vegetation, minimize the use of ammunition containing steel and avoid shooting under hot, dry and windy conditions.
- Wildfires started by the improper use of exploding targets burned thousands of acres in Washington so far this year.
- Exploding targets and tracer rounds are prohibited on public lands.
- Avoid shooting on hot, dry and windy days; and, avoid shooting into dry grass and rocks that might cause sparks.
- People who start wildfires (even accidentally) may be responsible for fire suppression costs.
- Keep plenty of water handy and have a shovel for throwing dirt on the fire.
- Contact your local agency for fire restrictions.
- Report fires by calling 911; give fire's location and what is in danger.
- Orchard debris burning:
  - Avoid burning when it's hot, dry and windy.
  - Stay with the fire, with a shovel or rake, until cool. Have a water hose connected to a water supply.
  - Keep your pile small. Burn only one at a time.
  - Radiant heat can ignite nearby grass and shrubs.

### Agriculture equipment:

#### Watch for sparks.

- Make sure equipment is properly maintained.
- Clear away or be aware of debris and rocks in the area.
- Have water and a fire extinguisher on hand.

Checking for and fixing fire hazards before starting work each day will reduce the chance of costly equipment fires. Look for:

- any buildup of crop residue around the engine, exhaust system, belts and chains
- damaged exhaust system components
- worn or badly frayed drive belts
- broken or exposed electrical wiring
- the odor of burning electrical wiring
- worn or mis-aligned moving parts, which can indicate the lack of lubricant
- signs of leaking fluids, oil and fuel

### **Messaging for Fire Prevention Material**

#### General Messages

- Approximately 75% of all wildfires are human caused. These accidental fires endanger communities, cost taxpayers millions of dollars every year to suppress, and can cause long-term damage to the environment.
- Do not to bring fireworks or exploding targets onto public lands at any time.
- People who start wildfires (even accidentally) may be responsible for fire suppression costs.
- Contact your local agency for fire restrictions and closures.

#### Homeowners

- Never dump ashes from fireplace or wood stoves onto vegetation.
- Debris Burning
  - Contact \_\_\_\_\_ before you burn yard debris.
  - Do all yard maintenance that requires a gas or electrical motor before 10:00 a.m.
  - Consider the alternatives to burning. Some types of debris such as leaves, grass, and stubble may be of more value if used for compost.

#### Vehicles

- Nearly all vehicle-caused wildfires are the result of lack of knowledge needed to avoid hazardous situations or inattention at critical times.
- Make sure your ATV or other off-highway vehicle has a spark arrester that is clean, properly installed and operational. Hot exhaust pipes and mufflers can start a fire that you won't even see before it is too late!
- Don't park or pull off onto dry grass or brush; exhaust systems can heat up to 1,000 degrees and cause a fire.
- Don't let chains drag when hauling a boat, trailer or equipment; dragging chains will throw sparks.

#### Recreation (General)

- Know before you go—check for any fire restrictions that may be in effect.
- Make sure cigarette butts are properly extinguished.
- Be careful with gas lanterns, barbeques, gas stoves and anything else that can be a source of ignition for a wildfire.

- Campfires
  - Abandoned campfires are a major source of human-caused fires. Warming fires, recreational campfires, and backcountry campfires are all sources of fire escapes. Fires are abandoned with the expectation that the fire is completely out or cool enough it will go out on its own. Abandoned campfires are often a result of failed attempts to properly extinguish the fire completely. People engaged in outdoor recreation don't intentionally leave fires with the thought the fire will escape.
  - Clear a campfire site down to bare soil with a 10-foot clearance around it.
  - Build the fire away from overhanging branches, steep slopes and dry grass.
  - Never leave a campfire unattended. Even a small breeze can cause a fire to spread rapidly.
  - Keep a bucket of water and a shovel near the campfire.
  - The non-resident visiting a recreation site may not be familiar with the dynamics of weather variations, effects of low humidity, and wind patterns. A campfire left in the cool conditions of the morning seems harmless.
  - When putting a campfire out, drown it with water. Stir the fire with water until all fuel is cold to the touch of the back of the hand.
  
- Target Shooting
  - Shooting fires are a growing concern in wildfire starts. Fires are attributed to exploding targets and ammunition sparking off rocks and other hard-surfaced materials during conditions of dry fuels.
  - Shooters do not intend to start wildfires through their activities; most people are very engaged in protection of their surroundings, yet accidents happen unexpectedly.
  - Wildfires caused by recreational target shooting in dry grasses have steadily increased on the Spokane District over the last few years. The easiest ways to prevent these fires from starting is to ensure your target area (at least 20 feet around the target) is free of dry vegetation, minimize the use of ammunition containing steel and avoid shooting under hot, dry and windy conditions.
  - Exploding targets and tracer ammo are NOT allowed on public lands.

#### Industrial equipment

- When operating stationary machinery, make sure dried grass, leaves and other flammable materials have been cleared away to bare dirt. Have a fire extinguisher, bucket of water or hose and a shovel nearby for emergencies.
- Remove rocks in an area before you begin operating equipment. Rocks hidden in grass or weeds can spark a wildfire when struck with a metal blade.
- All types of equipment and vehicles including chain saws, portable generators, cross-country vehicles, and trail bikes require spark arresters if used in or near grass, brush or a wooded area.

- Make sure you are clear of any vegetation while using any equipment that may spark, such as welding equipment, grinders and other power tools.

## Agriculture

- Orchard debris burning
  - Avoid burning when it's hot, dry and windy.
  - Stay with the fire with a shovel or rake, until cool.
  - Have a water hose connected to a water supply.
  - Keep your pile small. Burn only one at a time.
  - Make an area free of grass (bare soil) that is twice the height of nearby vegetation. Radiant heat can ignite nearby grass and shrubs.
- Agriculture equipment:  
Watch for sparks.
  - Make sure equipment is properly maintained.
  - Clear away or be aware of debris and rocks in the area.
  - Have water and a fire extinguisher on hand.

## Fire Adapted Communities messaging

- A fire adapted community accepts fire as part of the natural landscape. The community understands its fire risk, and takes action before a wildfire to minimize harm to residents, homes, businesses, parks, utilities, and other community assets. These collective actions empower all residents to be safer in their environment.
- A fire adapted community is one that, through its own actions, has mitigated, prepared for and can live with a wildland fire without extensive suppression resources and with a lowered level of risk to life or property.
  - It's a new way to look at wildfire mitigation in the larger community context.
  - It bundles a variety of mitigation tools to help communities reduce wildfire risk.
  - It brings more local stakeholders to the table to take responsibility for mitigation on the local level.
  - It links community mitigation efforts to the larger landscape risks and relates it to wildfire response.
  - A fire adapted community includes the following:  
Firewise, Fuel reduction, Forest Management, Internal Safety Zones, Ready, Set, Go, Exterior fuel buffer, Prevention education, Local capacity, CWPP, Cooperative fire agreements.
  - The WA-FAC Network uses a grass-roots approach that connects communities and coalitions, fosters relationships between peers and facilitates learning and sharing across geographic, organizational, and interdisciplinary divides.




