6. Weather Forecast For Period			
Night: Mostly clear but continued low visibility in dense smokie. Low of 62degrees with the relative humidity rising to around 100%. The 20 ft. winds will be E at 6-9 mph in the evening, decreasing to 2-4 mph after 2300.			
7. General Safety Message			
Keep your guard up for changing conditions and react accordingly. Maintain situational awareness at all times. Think ahead and have a contingency plan. Know escape routes and safety zones. Have your headlights on at all times, especially in heavy smoke.

DATE: 5-11-07

Op Period: Night Shift

Major Hazards and Risks:

Driving, Severe Fire Behavior & Structural Protection

Fire Order of the Day –Obtain current information on fire status

Driving hazards –Drive defensively at all times. Watch out for vehicles and personnel along roads. Use seat belts at all time. Traffic congestion around ICP and at intersections and evacuations. Use spotter when backing. Lights on. Remain alert for deer crossing roads.

Severe Fire Behavior in Night Time Operations = Maintain situational awareness. Rapid rates of spread and spotting. What is your contingency? Don't allow your escape routes to be cut off. Communicate. Know weather forecast. Clear and concise briefings.

Structural Protection = Firefighter safety and survival is number one priority. Down powerlines, gas tanks and traffic. Always stay mobile. Back in equipment. Identify escape routes and safety zones. Keep egress route clear. Go over guidelines on page 14 in IRPG.

Remember the Basics = PPE, Seatbelts, Drive slow, LCES, 10 & 18.

Hazard Trees = Identify, flag and mitigate by chainsaw felling or stay away. Be sure it's a hazard trees before exposing fallers to the hazard of mitigating.

THINK & ACT DECISIVELY: Remember if its Predictable, its Preventable

Common Denominators of Fire Behavior On Tragedy Fires

- *Most incidents happen on the smaller fires or on Isolated portions of larger fires.
- *Most fires are innocent in appearance before the “flare-ups” or “blow-ups”. In some cases, tragedies occur in the mop-up stage.
- *Flare-ups generally occur in deceptively light fuels.
- *Fires run uphill surprisingly fast in chimneys, gullies, chutes and on steep slopes.
- *Some suppression tools, such as helicopters or air tankers, can adversely affect fire behavior. The blasts of air from low flying helicopters and air tankers have been known to cause flare-ups.

SITUATIONAL AWARENESS

Work aggressively but provide for Safety First and Initiate all action based on Safety

Remain aware of the effects of weather

Ensure instructions are Given and Understood

Talk with local forces about hazards & risks

Remain in communication with crew, leader and adjoining forces

Determine **Safety Zones** and **Escape Route**

Establish Lookouts

Remain in control and be **responsible**

Stay Alert, Keep Calm, Think Clearly and Act Decisively

FORECAST ISSUED: 1500 May 11th, 2007 **Incident Meteorologist**

WEATHER DISCUSSION: Andrea will continue to dissipate off the eastern Florida coast as it drifts further south. Weak high pressure will control the fire area overnight resulting in diminishing winds and poor dispersion. Another hot and dry day is in store on Saturday, however, a weak frontal boundary will drift down from the north, bringing a slight chance for a thunderstorm by late in the day.

WEATHER FORECAST:

WEATHER: Mostly clear. Continued low visibility in dense smoke.

TEMPERATURES: Low 62°F, 2 degrees warmer.

HUMIDITY: Rising to around 100%, unchanged.

20 FT WINDS: East 6 to 9 mph in the evening, decreasing to 2 to 4 mph after 2300.

MIXING HEIGHT: Lowering to around 500 ft.

TRANSPORT WINDS: East 5 to 8 mph.

OUTLOOK FOR SATURDAY DAY SHIFT: Continued hot and dry. Partly cloudy with a 20% chance of a thunderstorm after 1500. Highs near 91°F. Afternoon minimum humidity 35%. 20-ft winds northeast 5 mph, switching to the northwest after 1700.
