Provide for safety of fire suppression forces assigned to the Florida Bugaboo Wildfire, and the general public, by adhering to LCES, work/rest guidelines, and maintaining public awareness of risks to the community. 2. Maintain and improve relationships with all cooperators, adjacent landowners including GOAL organization and the affected communities, local government and emergency management officials. Involve them in the planning process, and keep them informed on all fire activities. 3. Provide training opportunities for State, Federal, and Local governments and cooperators in the areas of Incident Command and Fire Management. 4. Manage the assigned fire and any new starts delegated to the team using unified command in a manner consistent with the Florida Division of Forestry and the U. S. Forest Service fire management policies. 5. Provide a strong commitment to cost containment.

Scale back suppression resources to a level manageable by a Type III organization that will provide continued patrol, mop up and rehab on the Florida Bugaboo Fire and support local agency needs.			
7. Human Resource Policy			
<p>The National Incident Management Organization (NIMO) Atlanta Team is committed to a “zero tolerance” policy against inappropriate behavior during incident operations. Alcohol is strictly prohibited from the fire camp and all other incident locations. - 2. MAKE CERTAIN TO HAVE ALL YOUR CTR'S TURNED IN THE DAY BEFORE YOU DEMOB, THEN THE TIME UNIT WILL HAVE ONLY THE LAST SHIFT TO ENTER INTO THE SYSTEM MAKING CHECKING OUT MORE EFFICIENT AND FASTER.**
- 3. IF YOU REQUIRE A FLIGHT FOR TRAVEL TO YOUR HOME UNIT, TRAVEL ARRANGEMENTS WILL HAVE TO BE MADE AT LEAST 48 HOURS IN ADVANCE OF ACTUALLY BEING DEMOBED.**
- 4. AFTER YOUR LAST SHIFT OBTAIN AN EVALUATION FROM YOUR SUPERVISOR.**
- 5. NO PERSON SHALL BE RELEASED PRIOR TO OBTAINING ADEQUATE REST AS PROVIDED FOR BY AGENCY RULES AND POLICY. RESOURCES THAT ARE REASSIGNED WILL BE RELEASED THE MORNING AFTER THEIR LAST SHIFT. LOCAL RESOURCES RETURNING HOME WILL BE RELEASED AFTER SHIFT IF THEY CAN ARRIVE HOME BEFORE 2200.**
- 6. ON THE DAY FOR YOUR DESIGNATED DEMOB, PLEASE REPORT TO THE DEMOB UNIT IN THE ICP AND PICK UP DEMOB FORM.**
- 7. REPORT TO THE DESIGNATED UNITS AS LISTED ON THE DEMOB FORM.**
- 8. RETURN TO DEMOB WHEN YOU HAVE COMPLETED CHECKOUT AT ALL UNITS.**
- 9. WHEN YOU HAVE BEEN SUCCESSFULLY DEMOBED, THE INCIDENT COMMANDERS AND TEAMS WISH YOU A SAFE TRIP HOME. THANK YOU AND GOOD-BYE.**

The Best Thing You Can Do To Avoid Lightning Danger Is Learn And Practice Good Lightning Safety!

No Place Outside Is Safe Near A Thunderstorm!

The '**30-30 Rule**' Offers The Best Lightning Safety Guidance For The General Public. When You See Lightning, Count The Time Until You Hear Thunder. If That Is **30 Seconds** Or Less, The Thunderstorm Is Close Enough To Be Dangerous – Seek Shelter (if you can't see the lightning, just hearing the thunder is a good back-up rule). Wait **30 Minutes** Or More After The Lightning Flash Before Leaving Shelter.

A House, Or Other Fully Enclosed Substantially Constructed Building, Offers Your Best Protection Against Lightning ("substantially constructed" means it has wiring and plumbing). Monday: Partly cloudy. Lows in the upper 60s. Highs in the mid 90s. East winds 5 to 10 mph.





SAFETY MESSAGE **June 5, 2007 0700-0700**

Major Hazard and Risks:

➤ **Weather**

➤ **Wet Areas**

➤ **Hand Washing**

➤ All this week thunderstorms, down drafts and lighting may occur. Stay aware of the weather. If T-cells develop or you see lightning, report it and seek shelter. Remember down drafts can be very strong and drop snags and trees. Lighting can strike up to several miles away and in clear skies.

➤ The water we received is great. However, it is permitting snakes and other critters to reclaim their natural habitats. Beware you may encounter slithering critters.

➤ Sure you wash your hands after you sneeze into them, but we've heard reports that some folks are reaching into the drinks coolers after working the fold-a-tanks, in standing water, etc, and not washing their hands. If you can't wash your hands with soap and water after such activity at least use hand sanitizer often.

STANDARD FIREFIGHTING ORDERS

1. Keep informed on fire weather conditions & forecasts
2. Know what your fire is doing at all times
3. Base all actions on current & expected behavior of the fire
4. Identify escape routes & safety zones, and make them known
5. Post lookouts when there is possible danger
6. Be alert. Keep calm. Think clearly. Act decisively.
7. Maintain prompt communications with your forces, your supervisor and adjoining forces.
8. Give clear instructions and insure they are understood.
9. Maintain control of your forces at all times.
10. Fight fire aggressively, having provided for safety first.
