5. General Control Objectives For The Incident (Include Alternatives) Provide for the safety of the public and local communities by working closely with local Fire, Emergency Mgt and Law Enforcement agencies. Keep these agencies and the public informed of current and expected condition as well as any impending evacuations. Upon request of the local unit, provide support and/or resources for any new starts. Promptly suppress any reburns near homes or structures. Suppress reburns near roadways and logging operations. Mop up perimeter to a distance that ensures the fire can not cross control lines. suppress any reburn within 100 ft of the perimeter. Provide and document training opportunities as appropriate within cost constraints. Consider trainees for any and all unfilled positions or replacements. As the weather allows and fire behavior moderates prepare to transfer command back to local jurisdictions by out planning for resources needs, completing all reporting requirements, after action reviews and closing out financial records. File all records as per standards and complete documentation package and boxes. Cost containment is an important aspect of any incident managed by this team. Resources will be released once they are excess to the incident regardless of time remaining. Track and report costs daily, ensure costs are commensurate with fire complexity.

7. General Safety Message How do "Mental Models" affect our decision making. Mental models are our vision or memory of how things are. Sometimes these are based on experiences, lessons learned and sometimes they are based on our perceptions or what we believe. Metal models are useful and often keep us from danger. At other times mental models can lead us to assume things are a certain way, when in fact they are far different. An example: if we always send three engines to every new start because that's what we've always done and what our predecessors did....and we do this with no consideration for what the fire is doing or what the weather is.....then we could be exposing twice as many people to the hazards of driving on the road as need to suppress that fire. Think about what your mental models are, how many have led you to make incorrect decision?

WEATHER DISCUSSION: A cold front will continue to drop south this morning, then become nearly stationary just south of the area most of this weekend. This will result in increased chances of showers and thunderstorms, along with cooler temperatures. High pressure will then build into the region early next week, with warmer and drier conditions expected.

FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Mostly cloudy. Numerous showers and thunderstorms, mainly in the afternoon. Rain will be heavy at times. Chance of rain 70%.

MAX TEMPERATURES: 88 to 90 (24 hour trend ~ 6 degrees cooler).

MIN HUMIDITY: 60% to 65% (24 hour trend ~ 10-15% higher).

20 FT WINDS: East 4 to 7 mph, increasing to 8 to 11 mph with gusts to 16 mph in the afternoon.

SEABREEZE PASSAGE: N/A

STABILITY/INVERSION: Inversion lifting ~ 9 AM. Mixing heights around 4500'. Transport winds east 14 mph. Dispersion Index 34.


